

THE TRIDUUM & EASTER

After 40 Days of Lent, the Christian Year has now reached its climax. We have come to the celebration of the suffering, death, and resurrection of our Lord Jesus Christ. This is the celebration for which we have been preparing throughout Lent. Now we see what our Savior came to do. We see Him suffer and die for our sins and for the sins of the world. And we see Him rise triumphantly on Easter morning to assure us that our salvation is complete, the victory is won.

Prior to the fourth century, Easter Day itself included all three emphases: Christ's suffering, death, and resurrection But the early Church fathers decided that it might be wise to spread those three emphases out over three days.



MAUNDY THURSDAY commemorates the beginning of Christ's suffering, as he gathers in the upper room, washes his disciples' feet, institutes Holy Communion, then proceeds to the Garden of Gethsemane for prayer.



GOOD FRIDAY ponders the intensity of Christ's passion, as he is put on trial before Pontius Pilate, scourged, and crucified. This is the central event in all of Christianity. On the cross, Jesus declares of the world's salvation, "it is finished!"



On **HOLY SATURDAY** evening, believers gathered for the Vigil of Easter. It was not the high festival service of Easter. Rather, it was a service to prepare oneself for that festival. The Vigil was used as the entrance into the Church, as converts to Christianity were baptized, confirmed, and communed for the first time—all during the Vigil. Baptism connects us to Christ's death and resurrection, which we celebrate whenever we eat His body and drink His blood for the forgiveness of our sins in the Lord's Supper.

The Triduum properly concludes with the Easter Vigil, but for churches which do not have a service on Holy Saturday, the *Triduum* concludes with the **EASTER MORNING** service. On this day we celebrate the risen Lord. The Paschal Candle—lit during the Easter Vigil—remains lit throughout the entire Easter season, reminding us and all believers of the connection between the resurrection of Christ and their baptisms. The Alleluias that have been silent for 40 days are shouted and sung with exuberance and joy. He is risen! He is risen indeed! Alleluia!

The great theologian of the early Church, St. Augustine, called these days of special observance, "the most holy *Triduum* of the crucified, buried, and risen Lord" (*Triduum* is Latin for *three days*). These days have long been understood as the climax of the Church's year. Together they form a unit. Therefore, as we celebrate the Triduum, our worship will form a single unit. What follows is a single service, celebrated over three days (four with Easter Sunday included), which will take us through our Savior's suffering to his glorious triumph on Easter.

Because the **TRIDUUM** is a unit, please note the following things:

- There is no benediction at the end of the Maundy Thursday service, as the service has not ended, but merely paused. The benediction will occur at the end of the service on Easter.
- There is no pre-service music to the Good Friday service, because the service is not really beginning, but resuming from the day before. The congregation gathers in silence. In the same way, there is no benediction at the end of the Good Friday service, as the service has not ended, but merely paused.
- After the Maundy Thursday and Good Friday services, you are invited to remain as long as you would like, for prayer and meditation, and then asked to leave the church in silence. There is no post-service music, because the service has not ended, merely paused.


OUR ENTIRE HOLY WEEK WORSHIP IS PRINTED IN THIS BOOKLET

The orders of worship that we use are based on ancient customs and traditions of the Christian Church. In these forms of worship, we join with Christians who have worshiped in the same way – often even using the same words – from throughout the centuries. Red *Christian Worship* hymn books containing the hymns for the service are located in the racks on the pews. If at any time in the service you have a question, please feel free to ask someone sitting near you for help. We are more than happy to assist you in any way we can.

Each service begins with an explanation of the customs and history of the day and the worship service. Worshipers are encouraged to page through the service for the day to familiarize themselves with the flow of worship, to see how interconnected the services over these three days are (and the benefit to attending them all), and to better see the richness and depth of the message. For this reason, you are invited to take this booklet home with you. But since this worship folder will be used for our entire Holy Week worship, you are asked to bring it back with you for worship. If you choose not to take this book home, please return it to one of the ushers as you leave the church.

MAUNDY THURSDAY

As with Ash Wednesday, Maundy Thursday marks a unique place in the church calendar. Just as Ash Wednesday begins Lent, so Maundy Thursday marks the end of Lent proper and the beginning of the Three Holy Days of Christendom – the Triduum (Latin for "three days"). The services of Maundy Thursday, Good Friday and Easter combine into a single three-day unit that celebrates the true Passover of our Lord Jesus.

The word **Maundy** comes from the Latin *mandatum novum*, the "new command" Jesus spoke in John 13:34, to "love one another as I have loved you." The institution of the Lord's Supper sets forth the depth of Jesus' love and gives the Church power to live out his command. Maundy Thursday is a festival in which reconciliation is solemnly expressed and in which the congregation makes its transition from preparation for the celebration of the paschal mystery to the celebration itself.

The post-Communion action of stripping the altar has its roots in the early custom of preparing the church for Good Friday and Easter by means of thoroughly cleaning and washing the altar and chancel. After the post-Communion prayer, the altar, which represents the presence of Christ, is solemnly stripped of its vestments and appointments in memory of the abandonment of Jesus in Gethsemane.

The liturgy then ends in silence. The congregation hears no final blessing – yet. Rather, the three services of the Triduum flow into one another as the congregation disperses in silence, to reassemble on Good Friday.



THE CONFESSIONAL SERVICE

The service of corporate confession causes us to confess our sins, but especially receive God's absolution, which He has promised to us in our Baptism.

What does this mean?

God certainly tempts no one to sin, but we pray in this petition that God would guard and keep us so that the devil, the world and our own flesh may not deceive us nor lead us into misbelief, despair and other shameful sin and vice; and though we be thus tempted, that we may still in the end overcome and retain the victory.

Into Temptation Lead Us Not | 410 v. 7

HOMILY "Lead Us Not Into Temptation"

Luke 22:7-34, 39-46

⁷ The day of Unleavened Bread arrived, when it was necessary to sacrifice the Passover lamb. ⁸ Jesus sent Peter and John, saying, "Go prepare the Passover for us, so that we may eat it." ⁹ They said to him, "Where do you want us to prepare it?" ¹⁰ He told them, "Just as you enter the city, a man carrying a jar of water will meet you. Follow him into the house that he enters. ¹¹ Tell the owner of the house, 'The Teacher says to you, "Where is the guest room, where I may eat the Passover with my disciples?" ¹² He will show you a large, furnished upper room. Make preparations there." ¹³ They went and found things just as he had told them, and they prepared the Passover.

¹⁴ When the hour had come, Jesus reclined at the table with the twelve apostles. ¹⁵ He said to them, "I have eagerly desired to eat this Passover with you before I suffer, ¹⁶ for I tell you, I will not eat it again until it is fulfilled in the kingdom of God." ¹⁷ He took a cup, gave thanks, and said, "Take this and divide it among yourselves, ¹⁸ for I tell you, from now on I will not drink of the fruit of the vine until the kingdom of God comes." ¹⁹ He took bread, and when he had given thanks, he broke it and gave it to them, saying, "This is my body, which is given for you. Do this in remembrance of me." ²⁰ In the same way, he took the cup after the supper, saying, "This cup is the new testament in my blood, which is being poured out for you.

²¹ "But look, the hand of him who is going to betray me is with mine on the table. ²² The Son of Man is going to go as it has been determined, but woe to that man by whom he is betrayed!" ²³ They began to discuss with one another which of them it was who was going to do this. ²⁴ A dispute arose among the disciples about which of them was considered to be greatest. ²⁵ But he told them, "The kings of the Gentiles lord it over them, and those who have authority over them are called Benefactors. ²⁶ But it is not to be that way with you. Instead, let the greatest among you become like the youngest, and the one who leads like the one who serves. ²⁷ For who is greater, one who reclines at the table or one who serves? Isn't it the one who reclines at the table? But I am among you as one who serves. ²⁸ You are

those who have remained with me in my trials. ²⁹ I am going to grant a kingdom to you, just as my Father granted to me, ³⁰ so that you may eat and drink at my table in my kingdom. And you will sit on thrones, judging the twelve tribes of Israel." ³¹ The Lord said, "Simon, Simon, pay attention: Satan has asked to have you all, so that he may sift you as wheat. ³² But I prayed for you, Simon, that your faith may not fail. And when you have returned to me, strengthen your brothers." ³³ He said to him, "Lord, I am ready to go with you both to prison and to death!" ³⁴ But Jesus replied, "I tell you, Peter, the rooster will not crow today until you deny three times that you know me."

³⁹ Jesus left and went out to the Mount of Olives, as was his custom. His disciples followed him. ⁴⁰ When he reached the place, he told them, "Keep praying that you may not enter into temptation." ⁴¹ He withdrew from them about a stone's throw, knelt down, and prayed, ⁴² "Father, if you are willing, take this cup away from me. Nevertheless, not my will, but yours be done." ⁴³ An angel from heaven appeared to him and strengthened him. ⁴⁴ As he was in agony, he prayed more fervently. His sweat became like great drops of blood falling to the ground. ⁴⁵ When he rose from prayer, he went to the disciples and found them sleeping as a result of sorrow. ⁴⁶ He said to them, "Why are you sleeping? Get up and keep praying so that you may not enter into temptation.

CHRISTIAN QUESTIONS & ANSWERS

Drawn up by Dr. Martin Luther for those who intend to go to the Sacrament of the Altar After confession and instruction in the Ten Commandments, the Creed, the Lord's Prayer, and the Sacraments of Baptism and the Holy Supper, the pastor may ask, or one may ask himself:

- **P** 1. Do you believe that you are a sinner?
- Yes, I believe it; I am a sinner.
- **P** 2. How do you know this?
- From the Ten Commandments, which I have not kept.
- **P** 3. Are you also sorry for your sins?
- Yes, I am sorry that I have sinned against God.
- **P** 4. What have you deserved from God by your sins?
- His wrath and displeasure, temporal death and eternal damnation. Romans 6:21 and 23.
- **P** 5. Do you also hope to be saved?
- Yes, such is my hope.

- **P** 6. In whom, then, do you trust?
- In my dear Lord Jesus Christ.
- P 7. Who is Christ?
- A The Son of God, true God and man.
- **P** 8. How many Gods are there?
- Only one; but there are three Persons: Father, Son and Holy Ghost.
- **P** 9. What, then, has Christ done for you that you trust in Him?
- He died for me and shed His blood for me on the cross for the forgiveness of sins.
- **P** 10. Did the Father also die for you?
- He did not; for the Father is God only, the Holy Ghost likewise; but the Son is true God and true man. He died for me and shed his blood for me.
- **P** 11. How do you know this?
- From the holy Gospel and from the words of the Sacrament, and by His body and blood given me as a pledge in the Sacrament.
- **P** 12. How do those words read?
- "Our Lord Jesus Christ, the same night in which He was betrayed, took bread; and when He had given thanks, He broke it and gave it to His disciples, saying, 'Take, eat; this is My body, which is given for you. Do this in remembrance of Me.' In the same way also He took the cup after supper, gave thanks and gave it to them, saying, 'Drink from it, all of you; this cup is the New Testament in My blood, which is shed for you for the remission of sins. Do this, as often as you drink it, in remembrance of Me.'
- **P** 13. You believe, then, that the true body and blood of Christ are in the Sacrament?
- A Yes, I believe it.
- **P** 14. What induces you to believe this?
- The word of Christ: "Take, eat, this is My body Drink from it, all of you; this ... is ... My blood."
- 15. What ought we to do when we eat His body and drink His blood, and thus receive the pledge?
- We ought to remember and proclaim His death and the shedding of His blood, as He taught us: "Do this, as often as you drink it, in remembrance of Me."
- **P** 16. Why ought we to remember and proclaim His death?

That we may learn to believe that no creature could make satisfaction for our sins but Christ, true God and man; and that we may learn to look with terror at our sins, and to regard them as great, indeed, and to find joy and comfort in Him alone, and thus be saved through such faith.

P 17. What was it that moved Him to die and make satisfaction for your sins?

His great love to His Father and to me and other sinners, as it is written in John 14; Romans 5; Galatians 2; Ephesians 2.

- **P** 18. Finally, why do you wish to go to the Sacrament?
- That I may learn to believe that Christ died for my sin out of great love, as before said; and that I may also learn of Him to love God and my neighbor.
- **P** 19. What should admonish and incite a Christian to receive the Sacrament frequently?
- In respect to God, both the command and the promise of Christ the Lord should move him; and in respect to himself, the trouble that lies heavy on him, on account of which such command, encouragement, and promise are given.
- **P** 20. But what shall a person do if he is not aware of such trouble and feels no hunger and thirst for the Sacrament?

To such a person no better advice can be given than that, in the first place, he put his hand into his bosom, and feel whether he still have flesh and blood, and that he by all means believe what the Scriptures say of it in Galatians 5 and Romans 7. Secondly, that he look around to see whether he is still in the world, and keep in mind that there will be no lack of sin and trouble, as the Scriptures say in John 15 and 16; 1 John 2 and 5. Thirdly, he will certainly have the devil also about him, who with his lying and murdering, day and night, will let him have no peace within or without, as the Scriptures picture him in John 8 and 16; 1 Peter 5; Ephesians 6; 2 Timothy 2.

NOTE: These questions and answers are no child's play, but are drawn up with great earnestness of purpose by the venerable and pious Dr. Luther for both young and old. Let each one take heed and likewise consider it a serious matter; for St. Paul writes to the Galatians, chapter six: "Do not be deceived; God is not mocked."

CONFESSION & ABSOLUTION

- **P** From the heart, let us confess our sins unto God.
- O Lord, our God! We come before You as poor, sinful beings, and are without excuse in that we have sinned against You by thought, word, and deed. But we believe in Your only-begotten Son, Jesus Christ, who has suffered for our salvation; and for His sake we pray You: Forgive us all our sins! Grant us Your Holy Spirit, to the end that we may believe Your pardoning Word, and that, according to the purpose and desire of our hearts, we may flee all sin, and may let Your holy and blessed will rule in all things. Lord, have mercy upon us. Amen.
- P Upon this your confession, I, by virtue of my office as a called and ordained servant of the Word, announce the grace of God to all of you, and in the stead and by the command of our Lord Jesus Christ I forgive you all your sins, in the name of the Father and of ↑ the Son, and of the Holy Spirit.

May He comfort your heart by His holy Absolution, and strengthen you by His Sacraments, that Your joy may be full. Peace be with you!


THE STRIPPING OF THE ALTAR





GOOD FRIDAY

On Good Friday, the church remembers the crucifixion of her Lord. Her remembrance, while solemn, is not a message of gloom, but a service of adoration of Jesus the Lamb of God as He offers up his life.

Good Friday is part of the larger celebration of the mystery of salvation begun Maundy Thursday and culminating in the proclamation of Easter – the Triduum. As the middle day of the Triduum, Good Friday is prepared for by Maundy Thursday, and leads into the celebration of Easter. As such, the congregation gathers in silence before the service, and leaves in silence at the end of the service. There is no benediction, and no post-service music, as this service does not really end, but merely pauses until the glorious celebration on Easter.

The congregation is invited to remain after the service for silent prayer and meditation, then leave silently, maintaining the spirit of worship befitting this solemn day.



THE SERVICE OF PREPARATION

The first part of our service prepares our hearts to come before God. We do so through confession, and more importantly, we receive absolution, the complete forgiveness of all our sins.

P Almighty God, we pray that You would graciously behold this, Your family, for which our Lord Jesus Christ was content to be betrayed into the hands of wicked men and to suffer death upon the cross; through the same, Jesus Christ, Your Son, our Lord, who lives and reigns with You and the Holy Spirit, one true God, now and forever.

THE LITANY

SECOND LESSON

Hebrews 10:1–25

In fact, the law is only a shadow of the good things to come, not the actual realization of those things. 



HOLY SATURDAY

A Devotion on Christ's Passion, for use at home.

He was handed over to death because of our trespasses and was raised to life because of our justification. - Romans 4:25

Until now we have sojourned in Passion Week and rightly celebrated Good Friday. Now we come to the resurrection of Christ, to the day of Easter. After man has thus become aware of his sin and is terrified in his heart, he must watch that sin does not remain in his conscience, for this would lead to sheer despair. Just as [our knowledge of] sin flowed from Christ and was acknowledged by us, so we must pour this sin back on him and free our conscience of it.

You cast your sins from yourself and onto Christ when you firmly believe that his wounds and sufferings are your sins, to be borne and paid for by him...If we allow sin to remain in our conscience and try to deal with it there, or if we look at sin in our heart, it will be much too strong for us and will live on forever. But if we behold it resting on Christ and [see it] overcome by his resurrection, and then boldly believe this, even it is dead and nullified. Sin cannot remain on Christ, since it is swallowed up by his resurrection. Now you see no wounds, no pain in him, and no sign of sin. Thus St. Paul declares that "Christ died for our sin and rose for our justification" [Romans 4:25]. That is to say, in his suffering Christ makes our sin known and thus destroys it, but through his resurrection he justifies us and delivers us from all sin, if we believe this.

Christ would not have shown this love for you if God in his eternal love had not wanted this, for Christ's love for you is due to his obedience to God. Thus you will find the divine and kind paternal heart, and, as Christ says, you will be drawn to the Father through him. Then you will understand the words of Christ, "For God so loved the world that he gave his only Son, etc." [John 3:16]. We know God aright when we grasp him not in his might or wisdom (for then he proves terrifying), but in his kindness and love. Then faith and confidence are able to exist, and then man is truly born anew in God.

EASTER SUNDAY

With Easter, Christ fulfills the Old Testament Passover. Easter proves God's anger has passed over us because of Christ's sacrificial death as the Lamb of God. For this reason, it is most fitting to celebrate this fulfillment with the feast that Christ Himself instituted to commemorate His death and resurrection until He comes (1 Cor. 11:26): Holy Communion.

By the second century, the feast of Easter had developed as an annual commemoration. The festival day was soon preceded by a 40-day time of fasting in preparation for the celebration (Lent), followed by a 50-day season of rejoicing concluded by Pentecost.

The date for Easter differs from year to year because it is established by the phases of the moon (as was the Jewish festival of Passover). The Festival of the Resurrection is celebrated annually on the first Sunday after the first full moon (14th of Nisan in the Jewish calendar) after the spring equinox.

The early church saw Easter as something to be celebrated not just every year, but every week. Every Sunday is a "little Easter," celebrating the resurrection. But the annual celebration of Easter Sunday is the highest point of the church year. On this day, the church celebrates the resurrection of Christ from death and the restoration of life to those dead in trespasses and sins. All who have been buried with Christ through baptism are united with him in his resurrection and walk in newness of life (Romans 6:4,5). Today we celebrate Christ's victory over death, and the fact that because he lives, we also will live!

Easter Sunday also marks the return of "Alleluia," and the lighted Paschal Candle.

OUR COMMUNION PRACTICE - CLOSED COMMUNION

God, through St. Paul, explains the blessings of Holy Communion, but also warns of the dangers of eating and drinking the Lord's Body and Blood unworthily. We practice "closed communion" in order to protect anyone from receiving the Body and Blood unworthily. The Bible teaches that we are unworthy to receive this Sacrament not only if we don't believe in Him and His forgiveness (Matt. 10:32-33), but also if we don't recognize the presence of the Lord's Body and Blood in, with, and under the bread and wine (1 Cor. 11:26-29 and Acts 2:42); if we aren't repentant of our sins (Matt. 6:14-15): or if we hold to different confessions or beliefs (Rom. 16:17-18). We ask that only those who are members of our church body and who have examined themselves come forward to the altar. If you wish to commune here, we'd love to make that happen; please speak to pastor after the service.

THE PASCHAL CANDLE

Just as the candles of the Advent Wreath bring wonderful meaning to the celebration of Advent, so the Paschal Candle is intended to add meaningful symbolism to our celebration of Easter, Baptisms, and Christian funerals. It actually predates the Advent Wreath by over a thousand years.¹ The Paschal Candle is a special candle used at every service during the Easter season, and at Baptisms and Christian Funerals year-round.

The Paschal Candle symbolizes the resurrection victory over the darkness of sin and death. It emphasizes the presence of the resurrected Christ and the link between a believer's baptism and the resurrection (Romans 6). It is lit traditionally for the Easter Vigil during a special service that begins outside the church building. A fire is lit from which the paschal candle is then lit and then carried into a dark sanctuary. As the candle is carried in procession into the dark nave, so Christ lights our way out of darkness. During this procession, the bearer of the candle lifts it high and sings, "Jesus Christ is the Light of the world" to which all respond, "The Light no darkness can overcome."

The name *Paschal* comes from the Greek, *pascha*. Before the time of Christ, this word was used for Passover; after Christ, Christians took to using the word when referring to the Festival of the Resurrection (The term Easter came into use in later centuries).

On the Paschal Candle are a variety of symbols, including Jesus as the Sacrificial Lamb of God, a cross, the means by which we are saved through our baptisms; and two Greek letters, an *Alpha* [A] and an *Omega* [Ω], which remind us of Jesus' words in St. John's Revelation (1:8; 22:13), that He is the Beginning and the End.

The candle traditionally stands near the Baptismal Font to visually connect Baptism with the resurrection, proclaiming the message of Romans 6:3-5 (which is also used at the beginning of a burial service): In our Baptism we have already died and been raised with Christ.

Our Paschal candle has been given in memory of Dorothy Harding.

¹ The first Christian Emperor of Rome, Constantine (272-337 A.D.) "transformed the night of the sacred Easter Vigil into the brilliancy of day by lighting throughout the whole city pillars of wax".
